

Peter's Pencil: Our Indigenous Australians have lived in Victoria (and therefore Montmorency) for at least 40,000 years. Of their routine habits in Montmorency very little is known (ie: recorded) but one can assume they camped by the Plenty River, hunted and

gathered their food, and



tradition has it they had a 'sacred tree' at 17 Price Avenue (where a our members Janice and Ron reside). It is said the bark 'spiralled' up to the ancestor heavens. The tree was an Eucalytus melliodora (Yellow Box) which died in 2018 and was about 250 years old. (These two photos of the tree were taken in 2014 by the editor, where tree holes were in the proud residence of several sets of cockatoos and galahs). Earliest European residents of the area, Edward and James Willis, made their camp behind today's Lower Plenty Hotel, residing there (for three or four years) from Saturday, 22nd April 1837. Of the local natives ability to harvest food, the only comment the Willis Brothers made was: "all kinds of wild animals (save the wild dogs) being scarce owing to the enormous appetite of the natives. Opossums are rarely seen." (Cf: 'A PIONEER SQUATTER'S LIFE' by James Willis in the Historical Records of Victoria. Volume Six). So, the natives were extremely efficient in gathering for their needs and leaving little behind. An article in The Argus, page 7, 8/12/1908 recounts: *The black on examining* the bark of a tree could determine at once whether the marks made by the opossum's claws were fresh or not, and whether it had been ascending or descending. If he considered it was up the tree he would climb to where it was and with his stone

tomahawk would soon cut it out of its hole. The Willis Brothers had to leave our local environs, as the government was to sell the Crown Land on which they were squatting.

Stuart Alexander Donaldson (who later became the first Premier of NSW and was a public speaker of considerable power) bought the 925 acres for £1179 7s 6d in February 1840. A month later the land was up for sale in the Sydney Monitor and Commercial Advertiser of Wednesday 25 March 1840, page 3. It was advertised as 'The Montmorenci Estate'. Where this name came from is unknown, was it the name Donaldson gave the property, or was a name allotted by the Australian Auction Company who were charged with disposing of the land? Who knows, no one has ever been able to find any concrete evidence of how or where the name came from. Today it is commonly stated that 'Montmorency' is named after a suburb of Paris. It was James Donnithorne (retired judge who served in India) who purchased *Montmorenci* from Donaldson. It was he who had the following advertisement placed in the Port Phillip Patriot and Melbourne Advertiser of 31 August 1840, page 2: "all Persons found trespassing either by cutting or removing timber, or depasturing stock of any kind on the Estate of Montmorenci, situated on the River Plenty, and sold at the February Government Land Sale as Lot No. 2, will be prosecuted to the utmost rigour of the law, and any person giving information thereof will be liberally rewarded." Timber was a treasured resource and was needed for the supply of heating and building materials for the burgeoning town of Melbourne, it was a major and potential source of income. Donnithorne engaged John Stone to construct a post and rail fence at Montmorenci. Stone's rent was £30 per annum and he is the first-known tenant of Montmorenci. Margaret was his wife and the couple had three daughters: Ellen born in 1842 on the Darebin Creek, with Susannah and Margaret being born on the Plenty River in 1844 and 1846 respectively. Owner Judge Donnithorne would not pay his share of local road levy, which were set by the community for the main road to Melbourne and for a bridge crossing at Lower Plenty. Consequently, Stone was not a popular settler and he decided to leave for Gippsland a year or two after the birth of his third daughter. Life was not easy in those times. Stone was even threatened at gun point by an insane man at the 'Travellers' Rest', along the road to Melbourne, in August 1845. Stone died at Alberton, Gippsland, Victoria, on 26th June 1855 aged 55. So bowlers, these are sobering tales of the early days of Montmorency. It was difficult to find food, it was difficult to work as everything was done by hand without the support of electricity, you had to build your own hut and you had to keep away from those who wanted to take advantage or revenge of you. It would have been beyond comprehension or measure the things that we take for granted today eg: smartphones, the internet, space travel, genetic engineering, advanced medical treatments, electric cars, and many more. In our next newsletter will return to days of old and discuss William Seville, who followed John Stone in settling 'Montmorenci', which will eventually lead me into discussing the first record I can find c1860, of what sport was conducted in these grounds that we take for granted today. 
John Harford 31/10/1941-03/01/2024

To all our volunteers, again a job well done and without them the club would not be what it is today without your hard work and dedication.


Let us look forward to a far better season on and off the green in 2024-25. Do not be afraid to put your hand up to assist in the running of the club. The saying is that many hands make light work.





They much prefer playing against the Petrie Pathfinders, the Railway Steelers, the RSL Soldiers, the Monty Scout Pack and the Foraging Pigeons. At least fewer excuses and reasons are proffered for player absences when playing the more local teams.

The committee deliberates, debates, and sometimes even quarrels. They consider each

ant's skill, commitment, and team spirit. They strive to balance the teams, to ensure fair play and camaraderie. It's a juggling act of personalities and preferences, a puzzle that needs to be solved anew each week.

They constantly look to their new and recent coach, Rae of Sunshine, who last year cajoled most teams in the Ant Arena to reach regional or state finals. Rae's dedication and true interest in lawn bowls sees her playing in State Finals and even on occasions playing against such National teams as the Foraging Fire Ants, the Sydney Stalkers, the Canberra Raiders and on one occasion the Top End Diggers of Darwin. Despite the challenges, the committee perseveres.

'They really have an easy job', said one social ant who never plays in competition, and just watches the unending line of excuses and complaints that arrive at the Selection Committee Door, in order to evade various rules, regulations and expectations that exist in club 'Ant Arena'.

The Selectors understand that every ant, no matter how small, has

a role to play. They know that the strength of the team lies in each ant, but the strength of each ant lies in the team. And so, week after week, the 'Ant Arena' thrives. The sound of laughter and cheers fills the air as the ants come together, united by their love for the game. The tale of the ant selection committee is a testament to their dedication, a story of unity, perseverance, and the indomitable spirit of the ants. They have inspired all with their following ode:

A queen among ants, a marvel to see,


